## Lesson 3: Ocean Travel to the New World **9-12 Instructions for the Sailing Ship Section**

- Using How Big Was The Rebecca.pdf (in the Student Documents & Activities column), calculate area of a brigantine sailing ship. Imagine living and working in such a space for 70 days.
- Using Life on a Sailing Ship in the Early 1800 document (in the Student Documents & Activities column) read Philippine's firsthand accounts of life on the *Rebecca* and the US Government's report of passenger's experienced on Old-Type Steerage Sailing Ships in the early 1800's. Have students discuss the condition, what surprised them the most. Do your students think they could survive such a journey?
- Using A Summary of Reproducing the 18th Century English Sea Biscuit.pdf (found in the Student Documents & Activities column), make sea biscuits for or with the students, and/or students could watch "Ship's Bisket Hard Tack: 18th Century Breads, Part 1. S2E12" (9 minutes)
- As a class review the Transatlantic Travel Comparison 1818 versus 2018.pdf table (found in the Student Documents & Activities column). What can students add to the comparison? Would the students rather travel in 1818 or 2018? And Why?
- Using the Sailing Ships Resources.pdf (in the Student Documents & Activities column).
  - Students may investigate historical and modern wind-powered vessels, navigation, speed and efficiency and nautical orienteering.
  - Audio and video files are also available to allow student the experience of being on board a ship in the ocean during a storm.
  - Students may want to try their hand at sailing. Use the Sailing Simulator to adjust the sail and rudder given different wind conditions.
