I certainly wanted those items, but more than things, I wanted the tangible validation of my moral worth. I wanted to know I was good.

I think about my younger self every year as we get into the thick of our adopt-a-family charity. For those of you who do not know, Duchesne adopts families through Sts. Joachim & Ann parish and tries to provide them with a happy Christmas. Part of the adopt-a-family process includes getting lists of requests. Every year we have students who are appalled that somewhat expensive gifts are on those lists. I feel the same way at times. I then try to remind myself, and our students, how the myth of Santa conditions us. The kids whose families cannot afford to provide them with a present-filled Christmas are seeing the same commercials as the kids whose families can. If they are only good enough, Santa will bring them the full size lego X-Wing Fighter. Or maybe that was just me.
