Then I started looking into what is being offered in June and I came across the elective, "Religion and Literature." What follows is the description for the course: "In a Secular Age, Catholic philosopher of religion Charles Taylor traces the rise of secularity in the West, examining how we have come to inhabit an age where disbelief in the transcendent is not only optional, but the default setting for many. Through the vantage point of literature, this course will consider the arc traced by Taylor and explore how the shift from enchanted cosmos to disenchanted universe is manifest in the content and form of literary works themselves...A key focus of the course will be encountering modern literary responses to what Taylor calls 'the immanent frame,' with particular attention to texts that seem to crack open that frame and recover—or at least glimpse—a reenchanted cosmos."

Honestly, how could I be expected to pass on such a course. I don't know Taylor, but I have been discussing with my classes the idea presented above for several years. I can't wait to read both the philosophical framework, and the possible literature we might cover. Part of me wants to dig into the authors I love: Herbert, Donne, Morrison, Robinson, and, obviously, Dostoevsky. But another part of me is really hoping I get introduced to a host of authors I haven't had the opportunity to read.
