A few weeks ago, **Maggie Schneider** told me that she had been accepted to Brown University's pre-college summer program on environmental leadership. The summer program is centered on Brown's campus but also involves field work throughout Rhode Island. Students in the program "dig into resources about environmental advocacy and environmental justice literacy while learning about socially responsible leadership. They use the Brown campus as a site to explore the research that drives decisions in sustainability and the connections between people and the environment." Maggie is clearly excited about the opportunity. She is eager to live on a college campus for a few weeks and work with like-minded peers. Maggie also wants to capitalize on this opportunity to test the waters of environmentalism. Could that be a possible major for her several years from now?

Ailsa Ide will also be exploring new academic avenues this summer. She is one of 330 sophomores from across the state admitted into the Missouri Scholars Academy. Over three weeks this summer, Ailsa will participate in a "specially-designed curriculum with interdisciplinary courses, and a variety of stimulating extracurricular activities." The Missouri Scholars Academy is run by Mizzou's Honors College with the belief that "Missouri's gifted youth must be provided with special opportunities for learning and personal development in order for them to realize their full potential." Each scholar will take a major and a minor in one of the following fields: math, science, social studies, and the humanities. These choices worry Ailsa slightly. She was torn over the courses offered in previous years. If they offer both "Music Theory" and "Designing an Escape Room," which would she take? That's a good problem to have.

I couldn't be prouder of the students and am excited to hear how they fared in their programs.
