Hello all,

My favorite course as an undergraduate was on the 17th century religious and metaphysical poets of Britain. The most famous poem from the period is probably Robert Herrick's "To the Virgins, to Make Much of Time." It's the one Robin Williams uses at the beginning of *Dead Poets Society* to encourage his students to "seize the day." With all due respect to Mr. Keating, that poem is not at the top of my list. When the metaphysical poets are at their best, they are either being shockingly clever in their secular poems, or deeply profound in their sacred verse. Herrick's poem does neither.

A far better example from the period is George Herbert's "Easter Wings":

Lord, who createdst man in wealth and store,
Though foolishly he lost the same,
Decaying more and more,
Till he became
Most poor:
With thee
O let me rise
As larks, harmoniously,
And sing this day thy victories:
Then shall the fall further the flight in me.

My tender age in sorrow did begin:
And still with sickness and shame
Thou didst so punish sin,
That I became
Most thin.
With thee
Let me combine,
And feel this day thy victory:
For, if I imp my wing on thine,
Affliction shall advance the flight in me.

The first stanza tells the story of man. He was created by God "in wealth and store" but through sin became "Most poor." God then intercedes, and by the last line of the first stanza the fall of man has been redeemed through Christ. The second stanza mirrors the first, but at the individual level. Now it is not the fall of all humanity, but the poet's individual struggle with sin. Like in the first stanza, redemption through Christ allows for greatness. In addition to the profound simplicity of the poem, it is clever. Turn it 90 degrees. What do you see?
